



Quarterly indicators of the labour market

Situation on December 31, 2022

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Preface



The National Employment Office (NEO) regularly publishes its most common statistics. Extensive data on the NEO's most substantial missions are published on its website on a monthly basis. Apart from these tables, the NEO also publishes a monthly commentary on the evolution of unemployment benefits and of career break and time credit schemes based on our payment statistics. Furthermore, the NEO composes a detailed annual report. This consists of a volume on our activities, as well as a substantial statistical volume, describing all schemes that are a part of the NEO's missions (partial and full unemployment, career break and time credit...).

Our brochure called the 'Quarterly Indicators of the Labour Market', however, contains the most recent quarterly data on the NEO's missions. It also provides data on a number of external economical indicators, allowing us to view our data in a larger context, and some elements for comparing Belgian unemployment to European trends. Publishing these data on a quarterly basis enables us to detect trends for these schemes and for the labour market at large at a faster rate than is possible in the context of a yearly report. At the same time, the impact of seasonal or technical effects is softened when compared to monthly statistics. If possible, all data in the 'Quarterly indicators' are published as a series containing the five most recent years. In this way, the NEO hopes to put the most recent numbers in a larger context.

Since the mentioned publications are only being made available in Dutch and French, this abbreviated English version of the 'Quarterly Indicators' was devised in order to enable a larger international public to take note of its contents. Relevant metadata and mention of sources, however, are only provided in the detailed versions in French or Dutch. The English publication contains a summary of the most important trends observed in the brochure, as well as the statistical series containing all quarterly and yearly data on the indicators used for this analysis. The summary of the last edition of each year will focus on the yearly rather than the quarterly data. In this way, the NEO strives to contribute to the analysis and progress of our labour market.


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Summary of observations

Fully unemployed benefit recipients seeking work (FUBR-SW)

The number of fully unemployed benefit recipients seeking work (FUBR-SW) decreased in Q4 2022. On average there were 4,930 FUBR-SW. Compared to Q4 2021, this is a decrease by 4.3% (4,930 units).

Between Q4 of 2021 and Q4 of 2022 we observe:

- decreasing numbers of FUBR-SW in the Flemish Region by 1.1%, by 3.7% in the Walloon Region and by 8.3% in the Brussels Capital Region. In Q4 2022 we observe 122,972 FUBR-SW in the Flemish Region, 59,719 in the Walloon Region and 101,000 in the Brussels Capital Region;
- a decrease by 3,9% of male and by 4,9% for female FUBR-SW;

- decreasing numbers of FUBR-SW for the age class of < 25 years old (-9,7%), the age class of 25-49 years old (-4,5%), the age class of 50-59 years old (-2,0%) and the age class of 60 years old or more (-6,3%).

Fully unemployed benefit recipients not seeking work (FUBR-NSW)

The average number of unemployed not seeking work went from 21,204 in Q4 2021 to 13,865 in Q4 2022. This is a decrease amounting to -34.6% on an annual basis. This evolution is largely to be explained by regulatory reforms in the years 2015 and 2017, related to the age limits for requesting an exemption from registering as a jobseeker, as well as consecutive reforms of the scheme of unemployment with company bonus (namely the raising of age and career length requirements). Furthermore, their evolution is influenced by the effects of the babyboom generation reaching retirement age. Since January 1st 2019, the unemployed with company bonus can also opt for an early retirement before reaching the age of 65.

For the exempted elderly unemployed, we observe a decrease by 44.4% or -166 units. For the exempted unemployed with company bonus we observe a decrease by 38.9%: between Q4 2021 and Q4 2022, their number evolved from 18,088 to 11,051 (-7,037).

Influenced by these different factors, the total number of unemployed benefit recipients (seeking work or not and including the unemployed with a company bonus) in Q4 2022 amounts to 297,556 units, which is a decrease by 6.4% on an annual basis.

Partial unemployment

On average, partial unemployment amounted to 124,550 payments per month, which corresponds to 23,892 budgetary units (+/- full time equivalents). We observe a decrease of the number of partially unemployed (-48.0%) on an annual basis.

Of course, in observing these numbers, we need to account for the fact that analyzing the evolution of partial unemployment on an annual basis implies a comparison with a period in which the corona crisis still resulted in very high utilization of temporary unemployment. Compared to the previous quarter, temporary unemployment is increasing again, which is particularly the case for the scheme for economic reasons for energy-intensive companies, which was introduced in October.

Income Guarantee Benefit (IGB)

The total number of payments for the Income Guarantee Benefit (IGB) for part time workers has dropped by 8.2% on an annual basis. Since 2015, the numbers of IGB have decreased sharply in the wake of regulatory changes that took effect in 2015 concerning the computation of benefit amounts and allowance conditions.

Employment schemes

In Q4 2022 we observe a decrease (-6.1%) for the employment and activation schemes and a decrease (-10.9%) for the exemptions.

The evolution of employment measures is influenced by the transfer of competences to the regional level. In Q4 2022 the NEO still remains responsible for the execution of payments for certain transferred employment schemes.

Career break, time-credit and thematic leaves

In Q4 2022 we observe an increase (+2.7%) on an annual basis for the total number of benefit recipients taking a career break, time-credit or thematic leave (parental leave, leave for medical assistance, leave for palliative care or leave for informal care).

The number of benefits for employees interrupting their work through the time-credit scheme rose by +0.6% on an annual basis (+0554 units).

For the career break scheme, we observe a decrease, however, on an annual basis (-8.4%). This evolution is partially a consequence of the transfer of competences to the Flemish government since September 2nd 2016. Since then, there have been no new entries in the career break scheme for this region.

The thematic leaves show an increase (+8.8%) of the number of benefit recipients compared to Q4 2021. The evolution of thematic leaves is mainly influenced by that of parental leave, the largest scheme.

Observed labour market indicators

Q4 2022 is characterized by a pivoting economy in the wake of a general climate of crisis (the Ukrainian conflict, rising energy costs and inflation) that emerged shortly after the corona crisis. The economic growth on a quarterly basis is favorable by +0.1%.

Most labor market indicators show a negative trend. We see decreases for the number of job offers and the hours of agency work performed each day. The number of jobs lost due to bankruptcy and the number of collective dismissals announced rose. Furthermore, we observe an increase of short-term unemployment.

On the other hand, however, we observe a more favorable evolution of the creation of enterprises, partial unemployment and youth unemployment.

A crisis context seems to be emerging

In general, we could say that in the last quarter of 2022, a new crisis context is becoming increasingly noticeable in the above indicators. Although the number of unemployed benefit recipients (FUBR-SW) is still decreasing on an annual basis, the strength of this decline is diminishing since the beginning of 2022. Moreover, the number of new unemployed is increasing and meanwhile leads to an increase in short-term unemployment (< 1 year) of more than 10% on an annual basis. The number of partially unemployed is still falling sharply on an annual basis, but this is mainly due to the fact that the corona crisis had a strong influence on this number last year. Compared to the previous quarter or to the corresponding quarters prior to corona (Q4 2018 and 2019), partial unemployment appears to be quite high.

The number of jobseekers not working and not receiving benefits (JS-NWNRB) has also been rising again for several trimesters. In Q4, that increase is 19.9%. In particular, the number of jobseekers with Ukrainian nationality entering the Belgian labor market is increasing above average: their number is more than 30x higher in Q4 2022 than in 2021. We also note an above-average increase for Russian nationals, especially for voluntary registrations which have more or less doubled on an annual basis. In Q4 2022, more than 4 in 100 JS-NWNRB have Ukrainian or Russian nationality. In other words, in these figures we see an effect of the Ukrainian-Russian conflict on the Belgian labour market.

GDP



Conjuncture indicator



Harmonized unemployment rate



Harmonized employment rate





