



Quarterly Indicators of the Labour Market

Situation on the 31st of March 2023

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Preface



The National Employment Office (NEO) regularly publishes its most common statistics. Extensive data on the NEO's most substantial missions are published on its website on a monthly basis. Apart from these tables, the NEO also publishes a monthly commentary on the evolution of unemployment benefits and of career break and time credit schemes based on our payment statistics. Furthermore, the NEO composes a detailed annual report. This consists of a volume on our activities, as well as a substantial statistical volume, describing all schemes that are a part of the NEO's missions (partial and full unemployment, career break and time credit...).

Our brochure called the 'Quarterly Indicators of the Labour Market', however, contains the most recent quarterly data on the NEO's missions. It also provides data on a number of external economical indicators, allowing us to view our data in a larger context, and some elements for comparing Belgian unemployment to European trends. Publishing these data on a quarterly basis enables us to detect trends for these schemes and for the labour market at large at a faster rate than is possible in the context of a yearly report. At the same time, the impact of seasonal or technical effects is softened when compared to monthly statistics. If possible, all data in the 'Quarterly indicators' are published as a series containing the five most recent years. In this way, the NEO hopes to put the most recent numbers in a larger context.

Since the mentioned publications are only being made available in Dutch and French, this abbreviated English version of the 'Quarterly Indicators' was devised in order to enable a larger international public to take note of its contents. Relevant metadata and mention of sources, however, are only provided in the detailed versions in French or Dutch. The English publication contains a summary of the most important trends observed in the brochure, as well as the statistical series containing all quarterly and yearly data on the indicators used for this analysis. The summary of the last edition of each year will focus on the yearly rather than the quarterly data. In this way, the NEO strives to contribute to the analysis and progress of our labour market.




Summary of observations

Fully unemployed benefit recipients seeking work (FUBR-SW)

The number of fully unemployed benefit recipients seeking work (FUBR-SW) decreased in Q1 2023. On average there were 290,503 FUBR-SW. Compared to Q1 2022, this is a decrease by 4.8% (-14,613 units).

Between Q1 of 2022 and Q1 of 2023 we observe:

- decreasing numbers of FUBR-SW in the Flemish Region by 1.5%, by 3.5% in the Walloon Region and by 9.2% in the Brussels Capital Region. In Q1 2023 we observe 126,535 FUBR-SW in the Flemish Region, 60,582 in the Walloon Region and 103,386 in the Brussels Capital Region;
- a decrease by 4,4% of male and by 5,3% for female FUBR-SW;

- decreasing numbers of FUBR-SW for the age class of < 25 years old (-11,2%), the age class of 25-49 years old (-2,3%), the age class of 50-59 years old (-2,4%) en the age class of 60 years old or more (-7,1%).

Fully unemployed benefit recipients not seeking work (FUBR-NSW)

The average number of unemployed not seeking work went from 19,175 in Q1 2022 to 12,305 in Q1 2023. This is a decrease amounting to -35.8% on an annual basis. This evolution is largely to be explained by regulatory reforms in the years 2015 and 2017, related to the age limits for requesting an exemption from registering as a jobseeker, as well as consecutive reforms of the scheme of unemployment with company bonus (namely the raising of age and career length requirements). Furthermore, their evolution is influenced by the effects of the babyboom generation reaching retirement age. Since the 1st of January 2019, the unemployed with company bonus can also opt for an early retirement before reaching the age of 65.

For the exempted elderly unemployed, we observe a decrease by 46.4% or -154 units. For the exempted unemployed with company bonus we observe a decrease by 40.4%: between Q1 2022 and Q1 2023, their number evolved from 16,120 to 9,607 (-6,513).

Influenced by these different factors, the total number of unemployed benefit recipients (seeking work or not and including the unemployed with a company bonus) in Q1 2023 amounts to 302,808 units, which is a decrease by 6.6% on an annual basis.

Partial unemployment

On average, partial unemployment amounted to 130,349 payments per month, which corresponds to 30,749 budgetary units (+/- full time equivalents). We observe a decrease of the number of partially unemployed (-52.6%) on an annual basis.

Of course, in observing these numbers, we need to account for a general normalization of partial unemployment levels, which requires some heavy nuancing in light of the evolutions by sector.

Career break, time-credit and thematic leaves

In Q1 2023 we observe an increase (+2.3%) on an annual basis for the total number of benefit recipients taking a career break, time-credit or thematic leave (parental leave, leave for medical assistance, leave for palliative care or leave for informal care).

The number of benefits for employees interrupting their work through the time-credit scheme rose by +0.9% on an annual basis (+822 units).

For the career break scheme, we observe a decrease, however, on an annual basis (-8.6%). This evolution is partially a consequence of the transfer of competences to the Flemish government since September 2nd 2016. Since then, there have been no new entries in the career break scheme for this region.

The thematic leaves show an increase (+7.4%) of the number of benefit recipients compared to Q1 2022. The evolution of thematic leaves is mainly influenced by that of parental leave, the largest scheme.

Income Guarantee Benefit (IGB)

The total number of payments for the Income Guarantee Benefit (IGB) for part time workers has dropped by 18.9% on an annual basis. Since 2015, the numbers of IGB have decreased sharply in the wake of regulatory changes that took effect in 2015 concerning the computation of benefit amounts and allowance conditions.

Observed labour market indicators

Q1 2023 is characterized by the fallout from the economic turbulence we observed at the end of 2022. The economic growth on a quarterly basis is favorable by +0.4%.

Most labor market indicators show a negative trend. We see decreases for the number of job offers and the hours of agency work performed each day. The number of jobs lost due to bankruptcy and the number of collective dismissals announced rose. Furthermore, we observe an increase of short-term unemployment.

On the other hand, however, we observe a more favorable evolution of the creation of enterprises, partial unemployment and youth unemployment.

Business confidence indicator



Harmonized unemployment rate



Harmonized employment rate





